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Foreword



My journey to being better prepared to defend the truth about Christianity began years ago while I was serving as a part-time student pastor near Charlotte, NC, and working full-time as a public school teacher. I found that my students had questions about God and the Christian faith that I wasn't ready to answer. This led me to seek out resources and support.

During a summer student retreat, I taught from a book on Christian apologetics, and I learned that one of the authors, Dr. Norman Geisler, lived nearby in Charlotte. Nervously, I reached out to him, offering to take him to lunch. To my surprise, he agreed and, if I recall correctly, even covered the bill. That meeting was a turning point for me. Shortly after, I began studying under Dr. Geisler and other professors at Southern Evangelical Seminary (SES). The insights and training I received from them have profoundly influenced my life, and they are valued contributors to this curriculum.

What you're about to explore is a reformatted version of my doctoral dissertation from SES, developed under the guidance of Dr. Barry Leventhal and Dr. Doug Potter. Originally designed as an eight-week curriculum, our team has now streamlined it into five modules. This updated version also includes contributions from current SES faculty and president, Judge Phil Ginn.

In a world where skepticism grows, and hostility toward Christianity seems ever more common, how can we confidently address the tough questions about faith, truth, and God? What if our doubts and challenges could lead us to a deeper understanding and relationships with the One



Thank you for choosing this exciting five week curriculum where you will learn answers to some of the most common questions people ask about the truth of the Christian faith.





From the President's Desk with Dr. Phil Ginn

Several years ago, I delivered a sermon in a mainline Baptist church on the topic that Jesus is the only means of salvation and acceptance before a holy God. After the service was over, I was confronted by an

older lady who was a member and a volunteer worker in the church office. In an almost defiant tone, she proceeded to proclaim that "It seems to me that you are trying to form an exclusive club." To which I replied, "Madam, that may in some way be true, but the ironic thing is that admission in my exclusive club is open to everyone."

The thought put forth by this lady certainly is a prevalent one in today's religious circles. We hear a lot of talk even amongst churches about the ideal of inclusion and acceptance. Many self-proclaimed Christians point to the actions of Jesus as He seemed to often work with and amongst individuals who were not favored in society. It could even be said that He preferred the company of common folks as opposed to those who appeared at least to be more religious. All of this peripheral evidence is referenced by more "liberal" religious folk as an indication that Jesus was just about love and inclusion and that all should be welcomed just the way they are into the fellowship of the church. The thought just sounds lovely, doesn't it? Unfortunately, it is just not biblical.

+ LESSON ONE: The Truth about Truth

While it is true that one of the pharisaical knocks on Jesus was that He ate with sinners and tax collectors, His actions never were motivated by acceptance but rather redemption. Perhaps Pastor Sinclair Ferguson said it best: "It is misleading to say that God accepts us the way we are. Rather He accepts us despite the way we are. He receives us only in Christ and for Christ's sake. Nor does He mean to leave us the way He found us, but to transform us into the likeness of His Son. Without that transformation and new conformity of life, we do not have any evidence that we were ever His in the first place."

"Whosoever will may come" is a wonderful promise in Scripture but it undoubtedly entails a change of heart and acknowledgement of, and repentance of, the sin which permeates our lives. Not only is God a loving father but He is also holy, and it is only His grace that can save a soul and bring that soul into a saving relationship with Him.


Perhaps then this raises the question in the heart of each one of us, saint and sinner alike, "What is the evidence in your life that you belong to God?"





From the President's Desk with Dr. Phil Ginn

When brackish water is allowed to seep into a fresh water supply, the whole can easily be changed by the osmosis of even a small stream of a polluted medium. Poison, if introduced into an otherwise harmless drink

can be devastating or even deadly. Behaviorists use the word "syncretism" to describe the attempted merger of different and often conflicting belief systems. As it applies to Christ's church, this concept allows for an "inclusive" approach to tenets even contrary to the Gospel. Such welcoming of falsehoods (otherwise known as "sin") culminates in a faith totally different than what God originally wrought through the death and ultimate resurrection of His Son, Jesus, the Christ.

The end result is that currently only 6% of self-identifying Christians in our nation have a biblical worldview. George Barna gets more to the point, when he proclaims, "Discovering that so many millions of regular churchgoers possess indisputably unbiblical thinking about topics as fundamental as salvation, morality, and sin is an unmistakable sign that church leaders must reconsider how we are approaching the spiritual development of Americans. Whatever we're doing clearly is failing."

Truth That Matters was born out of the realization that the time is near in this country when there will be a cost for proclaiming Christ as Lord and there will be a separation of the counterfeit from the real. It is my prayer that TTM will become a blueprint for the resurrection of Christ's church in America and the revival of true faith in our families and individuals all across our beloved nation. As true Christians still have breath, there is hope for our nation, but our time is short, and we must now "redeem the time" that we have left.

Rock to Build On

God can't stop all evil acts without destroying all freedom to choose between good and evil, which would remove freewill.



Breaking It Down

If a person is forced to not choose evil then they are forced to choose good; which is not really a choice at all.



The same is true for love. If a person is forced to love, that is not love at all... it is akin to rape.



Taking away free will would take away man's ability to choose to do wrong but it would also take away his ability to choose anything good.
